When we want to describe how much of something is present or the intensity of something, we can use **Adverbs of Quantity**.

so...	so few	For Countable Nouns	The poor kids have so few toys to play.
	so little	For Uncountable Nouns	The poor kids have so little food to eat.
	so many	For Countable Nouns	There are so many books in the box.
	so much	For Uncountable Nouns	Mr Lee has so much money.
too...	too few	For Countable Nouns	We have 10 children but there are too few books for them to share.
	too little	For Uncountable Nouns	There is too little time to finish my homework. I can't finish it!
	too many	For Countable Nouns	There are too many books in the boxes. I can't lift them up.
	too much	For Uncountable Nouns	There is too much food in the fridge. The fridge door cannot be closed!
enough	For Countable / Uncountable Nouns	We have enough food to eat so we don't need to buy anything.	
not enough	For Countable / Uncountable Nouns	There is not enough food in the fridge. We need to buy some more.
